Expansion Module 2: Researching Careers

Introduction

The Department of Post-Secondary Education, Training and Labour (Saint John), School District 6 and the Work Room Career Resource Centres have developed a program to assist students and their parents (or anyone acting in a career coaching capacity) to create a dialogue about careers and provide tools to assist students in preparing their career plan. PACE (Plan to Achieve Career Excellence) is divided into 5 sequential modules that combine to create an effective career plan. This workbook supports the second module-"Researching Careers" by providing additional information, resources and activities to help people to conduct thorough career research and match their interests with potential career opportunities..

This workbook is designed as an "add-on" resource to be used as part of the main PACE career planning system. While this is not a required delivery component, it may prove useful to anyone who requires advanced career support tools to help them to progress to the next stage of their career plan.

The Department of Education have purchased this online career planning tool for students in New Brunswick High Schools and the public to use free of charge. Users can search a database of occupations to discover information on any career they choose, or if they can't decide on a career, they can access interest inventories that suggest possible career options based on their interests. After answering a series of questions, a list of career options will be provided that a user can explore further. This career planning tool is very easy to use and provides a wealth of information. What's more, the information can be accessed 24 hours a day from any computer! Contact your local Work Room Career Resource Centre or guidance counsellor to obtain access codes to use the program.

Information Interviews. One of the most effective ways to research a career is to find someone who is employed in the career field of interest and interview them. Most people are willing to talk about their career and this can be a very easy way to get an idea if a career is a good match before you spend a great deal of time, money and energy.

Your research should generate possible career options. Once you have a career choice (or a couple) you are ready to move to the next step (the six destinations) and put your career plan into action.
